

GATE SYSTEM IS MORE USER FRIENDLY

"Now we are hands-free," commented Jarret Miller, Park Superintendent.


Newly installed electric gate opener will make it easier to enter or leave the park after regular hours.

Gates are closed from 10 PM until 7AM daily. Formerly they were secured with a chain and coded pad lock. The code was changed weekly. Staff, campers and others with the code could enter, but had to get out of their vehicle and enter the

code on the padlock. Not always an easy task.

"This mitigates the issue of us having to assign personnel to close the gate every night at 10 o'clock 365 days a year," Jarrett said.

FoSASP contributed to the cost of installation.

Regular meeting of the FoSASP Board of Directors was held July 20.

Progress was reported on projects funded by FoSASP including the order and upcoming delivery of twenty burr oak trees; purchase of fertilizer and watering gators for the trees; installation of solar recirculation pump for the water feature at the Wildlife Viewing Blind; two new horse pens ordered for equestrian camp-ground. Projects in progress discussed included, water well and solar pump to supply water for Javelina Pond; building new structure at the Wildlife Viewing Blind with volunteers from the Downtown Lion's Club, and hat racks for the cabins.

Sally Scott was elected to fill a vacancy on the board.

Dates for Monarch Trail Ride, Oct. 15-17 and Annual Meeting and Fish Fry (Sept.12) were approved.

FoSASP will participate as a vendor at the Air Race Oct. 30-31.



Spotlight on a Volunteer

Cindy Middleton

South Dakota native, Cindy Middleton came to San Angelo State Park, thanks to the U.S. Air Force and a passion for horseback riding. She and Jerry, her husband of 33 years, also of the Air Force, were stationed at Goodfellow Air Force Base in 1984 and began riding at the park when it was still in federal hands.

“I rode out there before it was a state park, when it was Army Corps of Engineers land,” Cindy said. “There were no trails. Jerry and I would bushwhack our way around. The Air Force wanted to move me several times. I wanted to stay in a place where I could ride.”

“I just took off the uniform one day and came in as a civilian,” Cindy said. She retired from the Air Force after 21 years, then joined the civil service and retained her job in the base legal office.

As a rider, she got to know other riders, including Ruth Jordan, the founding president of the Friends of San Angelo State Park. She joined the board of the park support group about 2000.

“Hayden Whittington was already secretary and I’d fill in for him when needed,” she said. “In 2001 he decided he didn’t want to do it anymore, I became secretary of the board.”

She retained that position until 2019 when the board needed a treasurer. She was elected to that position and served jointly as acting secretary until another member was elected secretary in 2021.

Over the years, Cindy participated in a number of Friends events. “Most of the years, I was with the horses at events,” she said. “Jerry’s horse was good with kids, so I’d lead Scout around with kids on his back.”

One year, we were just getting into bicycles, so we put together a little mountain bike ride for kids on really easy trails.”

Cindy coordinates the annual fish fry for Friends members. She is a regular contributor to the Friends quarterly newsletter.

She often guides rides for people who come to the park with their own



horses. Among her favorite routes is the Badlands Trail on the north side of the park. “It’s rough and it reminds me of the Badlands of South Dakota, a tamer version,” Cindy said.

She has often served as the outrider bringing up the rear at the annual Monarch Trail Ride at the park, making sure everyone is OK.

Cindy has three horses currently. Chula, a quarter horses, is her main trail horse.

“She’s a very moody mare, grouchy,” Cindy said. “She does not ride well with others.”

The other two are rescues with lameness issues. Cisco, also a quarter horses, has led a guided ride or two. Walker is a 25-year-old black Tennessee walker.

“Everybody loves Walker,” Cindy

said. “He’s had his share of photos taken with a cell phone ‘between the ears.’ Photography is another passion that brings her to the state park.

“I love to take pictures of the wildflowers, and then I post them on my equestrian rider page on Facebook. I will say ‘This is my favorite.’ Then, ‘this is my favorite.’ All the different flowers come out at different times,” Cindy said. She has entered her photos in contest, including at the San Angelo Stock Show and has won on occasion. In addition to flower photos, which she said is a very competitive category, she has shared her photos of “horny toads, bugs, scenery, my horses, my friends and their horses.”


