


# From the Park Superintendent By Jarrett Miller - Assistant Superintendent

Proposition 5 – Proposition 5 passed with an overwhelming majority vote! Though we will not see immediate results and improvement here at SASP, rest assured San Anglo State Park is in line to benefit from the constitutionally dedicated funds of the Sporting Goods Sales Tax. This is a huge win for not only State Parks and Historical Sites, but for recreation and conservation work overall. Generations of Texans will enjoy the benefits of the now- assured funds dedicated to the beauty, splendor and serenity of these parks and natural areas.

Park Trails Improvement — The trail marker signage project is slowly coming together. With the addition of KC, the new Lead Ranger, completion of projects in progress is promising. We have set a goal to have Roadrunner Trail and Strawberry Trail completed with new signs by the end of January. So be looking for that.

Holly-Days in the Park — The Christmas event was a great success that could not have been accomplished without the FoSASP volunteers and funds Four hundred and fifteen quests come out to enjoy the festivities. That is about 100 more than last year's event. Thank you to the volunteers, FoSASP and SASP staff for all your hard work, planning and dedication to make this event possible.

New Year's Day Events — We hosted four different "First Day" events this year: an easy hike, a moderate hike, a horse ride and a bike ride. Over 100 people come out to take part in these events and they travelled a little over 500 trail miles that day. Thanks to all who planned, led or participated!

# Welcome KC Bailey, Lead Ranger

The position of Lead Ranger was vacated when Jarrett Miller was moved to Assistant Superintendent. Recently KC Bailey was hired to fill the spot.

KC comes to San Angelo from Monahans Sandhills SP where he served four years as Maintenance Supervisor and Lead Ranger. KC and his wife Sherry, a Principal Planner for the City of San Angelo, are excited about joining the San Angelo State Park family

Kenneth (KC) Bailey grew up in Corpus Christi, Texas. After graduating from Mary Carroll High School he joined the Navy, served just under eight years in the Navy and two years in a National Guard Engineering Combat Battalion.



After leaving the Navy he worked as a contract welder, building a heat exchanger for natural gas ship, pipeline welding and iron construction. He was the construction, restoration Foreman and Safety Manager for a copper ore reclamation, mining and processing plant that is listed on the National Register out of Arizona. He and his team designed a gold reclaiming process facility, a water and waste processing treatment process, a facility reconstruction and maintenance process and management of over 250 acres of the historic smelter land. The partners in this process were the City of Clarkdale, the State of Arizona and the Yavapai Indian Reservation.

KC left Arizona in 2013 to return to Waco, Texas. He went back to College for two years before going to Monahan's.

# **Ruth Jordan**

Friends of San Angelo State Park President By Laurel L. Scott

A short time after San Angelo State Park opened in 1995, first Superintendent John Culbertson reached out to early fans of the park to create a Friends of San Angelo State Park organization.

Ruth Jordan was one of those regular visitors, riding the trails on horseback with friends and organizing llama hikes as fundraisers for a 4-H youth.

"About twelve of us showed up, an eclectic group of people who were using the park," Jordan said. "We were given no directions. I could see there was a need to publicize that the neglected Corps of Engineers property that had become a new Texas state park. We planned and staffed events to get people into the park."

Jordan, who had recently retired as a campus counselor from Grape Creek ISD, was elected president of the Friends. She has remained the organization's only president for nearly 25 years

"There's never been enough money from the state so I could see we needed to raise money for improvements and emergency needs like light bulbs and toilet paper."

The first request from Culbertson was for the Friends to donate taxidermy costs to preserve the head of the park's beloved Bison herd bull. Solomon had died. Jordan and the Friends team raised \$500 and also got a discount from the taxidermist. Solomon remains a familiar face in the park headquarters' conference room.

The group opened a gift shop in the South Shore Gatehouse right away, selling T-shirts and other items. Members organized fundraisers, including equestrian trail rides and wiener dog races. Jordan launched a newsletter in 1998 to help get the word out about park events and to keep Friends members informed. She remains editor of the newsletter.

"We were the show," Jordan said. "We did the tours, we did the gift shop. We started making money and could buy things to support the park. I was the one doing the Longhorn-Bison tours with (former herd manager) Bill Guffey. Silver Bluebonnet Day for senior citizens began with my idea."

One of Jordan's favorite projects was an annual summer day camp named R.A.N.G.E. Outdoors. "We got a grant to provide canoes and bicycles, binoculars." We called on a lot of local people to lead nature hikes, teach disc golfand archery. We offered canoeing, mountain biking and fishing. From the day camp, we could see that people just needed to be introduced to the park's possibilities."

Her most proud accomplishment was in saving the park's Bison herd when the TPWD had decided to sell them off. She led a publicity drive to get the decision reversed. The park continues to have a small herd of the iconic animals, the largest mammals native to West Texas.

Her joy is in connecting the park to people.

"I hung in there because I could see the potential," Jordan said. "I realized that we had the ability to provide the funds for the park needs, that we could have an impact on the park. It is our own little piece of wilderness."
