A prescribed burn event was carried out recently. A burn perimeter was set around about 1,800 acres. Roughly seventyfive percent or 1,350 acres of the park's over 8,000 total acreage actually burned.

San Angelo State Park should be a very open mesquite savannah dominated by grasses. Absence of natural burning has resulted in succession toward a woodland habitat dominated by Redberry Juniper and Honey Mesquite

Fire is a normal, natural, and essential occurrence in grasslands. Fire frequency within the park and surrounding areas has dramatically declined during the past century due to land use practices and fire suppression actions.

A lofty Goal! Intentional (prescribed) burning has the long-term goal to restore natural plant communities by reducing both brush and cacti density and to increase the diversity by the reduction of juniper, mesquite, and prickly pear. Invasive plants, both native and exotic, are hard to control once they become established.

Improved diversity will be beneficial to a suite of grassland birds of conservation concern including Burrowing Owl, Loggerhead Shrike, Grasshopper Sparrow and Cassin's Sparrow. Invasive mesquite and prickly pear benefit none of these species. Many species of birds were adversely affected in the transition of dense woodland to open grassland in the treatment areas; however, habitat is still abundant for those species in untreated areas of the park and in the surrounding lands. The immediate effects of a prescribed fire on bird populations are negligible as they are highly mobile and quickly take advantage of these areas when fresh vegetation sprouts after the release of nutrients into the soil.

The effort to restore natural plant communities within the park started by the Corps of Engineers in cooperation with the Upper Colorado River Authority with the implementation and funding for aerial mesquite spraying that was quickly followed by prescribed fire actions. Quick strides were made toward reaching the goal.

It is anticipated two to five year fire intervals will be needed to restore degraded vegetation communities at the park. Once restoration objectives are achieved a longer fire return interval may be implemented.

#### Youth and Adult Hunters Hold Successful Harvest

During designated hunting days in the park, youth and adult hunters harvested ninety-one white tail deer. Seventeen javelina and five feral hogs were also taken.

Twenty-two youth hunters accounted for at least twenty-eight deer, fifteen javelina and one feral hog.

Adult Mentored Hunt was also successful despite the wind and cold. Some animals were harvested and memories made.

Hunting is allowed on specific dates for target species. Managed by Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists and staffed by park rangers, the hunts provide management of game in view of available resources to prevent over-population.

# Spotlight on a Volunteer **KAY REVIERE**

The Wildlife Viewing Area at San Angelo State Park is designed to be a place park visitors can go for an enhanced opportunity to enjoy a variety of wild creatures but it wouldn't work so well without dedicated volunteers like Kay Reviere.

The viewing area was created sometime after the park came under the control of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in the mid-1990's when a small building on the property was converted by park rangers into what is commonly dubbed the 'Bird Blind.' A concrete trough was added by a volunteer with running water. A variety of bird feeders went up. By 2010, the president of the Friends of San Angelo State Park, Ruth Jordan, had begun recruiting volunteers to go to the site and fill the feeders on a regular basis.

Kay has been doing that essential chore since that time and is the Wildlife Viewing Area's longest serving volunteer.

"It's so peaceful out there," Kay said. "Guess I'm just country at heart."

Kay grew up in Dallas but lived with family in Miles before settling in San Angelo with her husband Robert, who she met here. Her favorite job before retiring was driving a bus for special education students, a job she did for 15 years.

"Those were my babies," she said.

She has been volunteering at the Wildlife Viewing Area nearly as long. She asked her

close friend Darlyne Vietor to join her just a few months after she started.

The two friends are regulars on Saturday mornings. Other volunteers are committed to other days in the week to keep the local and migratory birds visiting. The volunteers put out seed provided by the Friends of SASP and often bring their own donations of oranges, suet seed blocks and even dried mealworms. Frequently seen species include quail, northern and desert cardinals, woodpeckers, native sparrows and doves. But that's not all.

"We get to see the javelinas," added Kay, a grandmother and great-grandmother. "When I first went out there, I saw one just standing there. Darlyne isn't afraid of anything so we spread a little seed on the ground for it, too."

Other mammals seen at or near the viewing area include porcupine, deer, rabbits, and foxes. Volunteers find evidence of raccoons in tumbled feeders and paw prints.

When Kay isn't available, Darlyne will go out with her daughter, Connie Vietor.

"I like doing it," Darlyne said. "They're out there in the trees waiting for us. They're not afraid of us at all."

"I enjoy getting to go out that way, seeing what's there," Kay said. "The birds will be in the trees when we get there and I'll say, 'OK babies, we're here. You can come on down.' They know our voices. That's how long I've been coming."
